

nce upon a time, children's entertainment really was just for kids. It was safe or simple or silly, something very different to what the adults got up to in their evenings. Not anymore:

This year sees plenty of offerings made by or for younger audiences, that shake off any dusty assumptions that 'youth work' is a lesser category. Just look at one of the most exciting choices in the Traverse line-up: Frankenstein: How to Make a Monster, a show arriving on a cloud of critical and audience acclaim from Battersea Arts Centre, that's devised and performed by the theatre's own youth group, the Beatbox Academy.

Their take on Frankenstein blends elements of Mary Shelley's Gothic classic with anxieties-about technology, social media, finding your true self—that street dance styles from bone breaking to tutting, flexteenagers navigate in their own lives today. It's delivered with wit and endearing honesty, not to mention mind-blowing beatboxing skills. But this piece of multi-disciplinary gig-theatre is also formally inventive, using the tricks of a musical genre to create atmospheric theatrical soundscapes, as well as sick beats to dance to.

It's astonishing, and would be astonishing whoever it was made by - the fact that it's their youth group has no bearing on the quality. Although it does take these extreme selfies," explains Anson. make the show feel more relevant.

Using music and street dance can be a canny way to reach out to younger audiences - especially teenagers who might have an inherited wariness about theatre not being for them. The potential power of shows for young people at the Fringe are growing up. genre-blending is something Bex Anson, director of Kid_X, is alive to. She describes her show as "a sci-fi circus concert: it looks like a giant comic book and plays like a video game, it's very high energy with a narrative that's a bit cyberpunk Romeo and Juliet."

The main characters are young performers that teenage audiences should be able to identify with: even if the action is set in a futuristic world where a body upgrade company rules the stock market and humans can live to 200 - at a cost.

"Malick Bright plays Android X, the lead. He's done a lot of music videos, and has a great array of ing, animation, robotics, krump. He's so expressive, able to tell stories through his body," says Anson.

His Juliet is played by Amanda Attwood, a circus ing. Which is relevant, because she plays Gabriella, a rooftop selfie queen. For the uninitiated, this really is a thing: the production took inspiration from Instagram star Angela Nikolau, 'an urban rooftopper' "They climb to the top of very high skyscrapers and

But the show also features musical artists who

are big in their own fields - even if they're usually more likely to start a show at 10pm than 10am. Glasgow institution Mungo's Hi-Fi bring their sound system, while rising singer-songwriter and rapper Eva Lazarus delivers vocals. It's about not patronising a youth audience by giving them a soft or diluted version - here they get the real deal.

"It's proper vibey, great music – dancehall, garage, drum'n'bass..." says Anson. "Gigs are always late night, so it's a little bit exclusive. But Mungo's haven't changed anything, they're just excited that a younger audience can get on board."

The same impulse drives other music acts - and whether kids (or their parents) prefer rock or raving, there's a party happening.

Junior Jungle Rave has become a festival favourite. J Nick Terrific and MC Rocky Patch leap about in animal print and spin jungle, drum'n'bass and hip-hop (with age-appropriate lyrical content only). Born in reaction to twee baby discos, Junior Jungle Rave ("big up to the littlest massive!") promises "no pop, no Disney, just proper tunes and real raving for kids and adults together." Their stated mission is to get parents dancing too - not standing, embarrassed, with hands in pockets.

Daniel Offerman, of Belgian band Comète, shares actually amazing shows for everyone this sentiment: "What we want to avoid is parents coming to our show and spending an hour watching their phone. We want an all-ages concert. It's touching to see children look up to their dad and mum and see them dancing.

Made up of members of pop and rock bands including Girls in Hawaii, Comète play their own tunes plus plenty of well-loved covers, from The Beatles to The Strokes. It'll reignite little audience members - and aim to re-ignite something in their parents too. "A classic, like 'Should I Stay or Should I Go' by The Clash, works with everyone, in every city, at every age," Offerman says. "It's funny to see a three-year-old child know exactly at what moment they have to scream!"

Apart from adjusting the volume so it's "not too loud for small ears", they try not to change their



show much. And he says they get amazing reactions from kids: "It's unfiltered and enthusiastic, and that's what we're looking for. We don't have a pedagogical idea behind it - it's just the excitement of seeing a rock show for the first time in your life: the drama, the lights, the electric guitar."

Sometimes, he admits, the grown-ups get even more excited than their children - reconnecting with that un-jaded, youthful joy at singing and dancing along to live, loud music. That's another thing about making amazing shows for young people - they're

Our Primary Times' review:

This French 4-piece band give youngsters a great taste of a real rock show, with a mix of older and more modern European music.

The stage, dry ice and lighting made it very easy to see the band of three guitarists and one drummer, and the sound system was just right to hear the music without being too loud for the younger children. There was a good mix of French, English and even one German track and the whole event felt just like a proper gig, not a children's show.

The interaction with the audience was good - telling us about the band and

getting us to wave our arms and dance along with the tunes "OK Edinburgh, give me your best dance moves!". It was all very light-hearted and the band made a good joke about an 'encore' plus being 'fluent in German' once we had learned the word for a song chorus.

The adults joined in toe-tapping with Trio's 'Da Da Da' and 'Should I stay or should I go' by The Clash so there was something for everyone.

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

I'LL TAKE YOU TO MRS COLE!

Imaginative tale of two-tone music and single parenting

Ashley's fed-up tidying the house, she wants to play her new records and dance instead. Even better, she wants to dress up as Princess Leia and act out her favourite *Star Wars* fantasy. But mum's on her case again, looking for help to keep the house spick and span.

Meanwhile, up the road, Mrs Cole lives in a jumbled mess of a house – and if Ashley's not good, mum will send her there as a punishment. Based on Nigel Gray and Michael Foreman's picture book, but re-imagined by acclaimed theatre companies Complicité and Polka, l'Il Take You to Mrs Cole! is a visual and musical delight for the ears and eyes.

Set in Coventry in 1981, the home of two-tone music and an era of racial tension on the streets, the show blends Gray's original story with historical references. So while Ashley is the focus, the world she's growing up in is woven throughout her story and songs (much of which will be lost on the children watching, but it's fuel for conversations with their grown-ups later).

As you would expect from Complicité, the theatre space is as much a part of the show as the actors. Images of what's going on inside Ashley's head are interspersed with archive footage, and projected onto everything from the wall to the fridge, while each challenge Ashley faces is met with a two-tone tune that has the audience bopping in their seats.

At its core, however, this is a show about acceptance, which is played out beautifully. Ashley's house is run on tidiness and discipline, Mrs Coles' is organised chaos – neither one is better than the other, they're just different approaches to life. (Kelly Apter)

ONE DUCK DOWN Engaging tale highlights the perils of plastic

He's painted a lighthouse without using ladders, taught the local seaguills to sing the national anthem, and now Billy has just one task left to prove his love for the demanding girl he loves.

It's his biggest quest yet – to reclaim 7000 yellow nubber ducks from the oceans and seas of the world and bring them home. Along the way he meets two birds with their necks stuck in a bottle top, an Arctic polar bear who's run out of ice to stand on, and a family of crabs clinging to a pile of rubbish as if it's home.

The story in One Duck Down may be fiction, but the event it's based on is true – thousands of plastic ducks really did fall off the back of a tanker. And, of course, our oceans really are filled with plastic, and marine and birdlife die each day as a result.

So hats off to Faceplant Theatre for finding a colourful and engaging way to deliver this message to a young audience, without ever labouring the point. Which goes some way to making up for the fact that almost all the witty wordplay is for the adults, not the children. (Kelly Apter)

Perfect introduction to gig-going for kids ••••

It's never too early to expose your child to their first live music experience; and in the case of the Belgian Compagnie Dérivation's in-house band Comète, it really is an early time. Half past ten in the morning might seem unnaturally early for parents to be dancing around to a rock group in a music venue, but it's probably the point in the day when children have the most energy to burn off.

Consisting of a quartet of musicians arranged in the traditional guitars-bass-drums format, Comète takes its members from a variety of Brussels indie groups. Their show is conventional by normal rock standards, but for kids, it's the perfect introduction to the basics of concert-going. The sound is at normal gig level, if not abrasavely loud, and the music includes a number of covers alongside the group's own material.

They play songs fit for different styles of dancing, including Hot Chip's 'Over and Over' and the Clash's 'Should I Stay or Should I Go', as well as more edectic bursts of Francois Hardy and Trio's 'Da Da Da', the latter on 'the world's smallest synthesiser'.

By the end, most of the audience, young and old, have forgotten the time and are out of their seats and dancing in the aisles. (David Pollock)

MUSTARD DOESN'T GO WITH GIRLS Young girls sets the world to rights in this lively musical OOO®®

There's a strong message about gender, conformity and challenging the status quo in this new show from Bric à Brac theatre. It's also not short on witty characters or passionate performances. But the storyfelling and language are tell-tale signs that this is the company's first show for children.

Tales within tales always come with an extra layer of complexity, and the performers do their best to delineate the two worlds. First, we meet a crocodile librarian on her last day at work (she's been asked to leave as she's too scary – though in truth she's utterly loveable), trying to work out which section of the library to place her only un-read book.

Then off we go, inside the world of the book, where another crocodile (only this one's mean) is ruling the town of Bow-on-Tie with an iron fist. Boys aren't allowed to bake or dance, girls can't do science or think about anything too complicated. That is until young Abigail discovers the croc's dark secret and sets about putting things right.

What it lacks in clarity, the show makes up for with enthusiasm, leading to a fun way to spend an hour. (Kelly Apter)

Assembly Checkpoint (Venue 322)

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It's never too early for musicloving parents to get their kids in the gig-going habit, as demonstrated by Belgian indie band Comète, who are rocking child-friendly early mornings at Assembly Checkpoint throughout the Fringe.

If there is a more joyful way to start your Fringe day, I have yet to encounter it.

The premise is simple: this most likeable four-piece band play a regular set of varied covers drawn from the rock, pop and indie canon for an audience of children and their accompanying adults.

There is no talking down to the children, no specifically pitched kids' tunes and no proscription of behaviour, as the assumption is that children and parents know how to have fun and express themselves to a rocking tune – in fact, a brother and sister who clearly knew the score were bopping in front of the stage from the moment the group fired off their take on The Beatles' I Want to Hold Your Hand.

This is the first of many astutely chosen melodic standards, all played at a decent but not punishing volume – no need for baby ear defenders here.

Hot Chip's Over and Overmakes for irresistible dancefloor fodder, there is happy anarchy in the toddler moshpit during The Clash's Should I Stay Or Should I Go and ridiculously catchy Europop selections from Stereo Total's Musique Automatique to Trio's Da Da Da.

Age guidance suggests the show is most suitable for the over-5s but, in reality, younger siblings are just as engaged in the important business of pogoing, twisting, clapping, swaying and waving those phone lights along.

Bouncing babies on their parents' shoulders join the joyful throng on the dancefloor.

The fun is over far too soon but Comète are called back for that time-honoured encore and we are treated to a rendition of Serge Gainsbourg's Eurovision classic Poupée de cire, Poupée de son which, like the rest of the show, was sheer delight.

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
